## LETTER FROM BOARD CHAIR LINDA SPOONER

Dear Friends,

First, thank you for the support you have extended to Mautner Project over the years since our 1990 founding by Susan Hester and a group of committed activists and volunteers. We continue to enjoy the deep commitment of volunteers and donors – institutional and individual – who have enabled Mautner Project to continue to provide our many services. We help our lesbian, bisexual and transgender sisters who are ill with cancer and other serious health problems, deliver education to health care providers around the country so that they learn to create welcoming and culturally competent environments, educate our own community about the need to develop and maintain healthy habits, and render assistance to community members who seek to get and stay healthy.

2008 was an important year of stabilizing and positioning Mautner Project for future growth. After a period of leadership flux, Mautner Project conducted a national search and hired a new Executive Director, Leslie Calman, Ph.D., who began work in January 2008. Leslie has had a long career in non-profit management and education centered on building better lives for women and families in the U.S. and in the developing world.

Just prior to joining Mautner Project, Leslie served for two years as Vice President of External Relations for the International Center for Research on Women (ICRW), overseeing the communications, advocacy and development teams for this \$12 million organization, and taking a leadership role in advocacy promoting U.S. policies to end child marriage in the developing world. From 1998 – 2004, she was Executive Vice President and then Senior Vice President of Legal Momentum, the national women's rights organization formerly called NOW Legal Defense and Education Fund. She also directed Legal Momentum's Family Initiative, a project that, by educating and engaging the public and decision makers, built support throughout the United States for paid family leave and quality child care, preschool and afterschool.

For the previous seventeen years, Dr. Calman was at Barnard College as a professor of political science and women's studies, and Director of the Barnard College Center for Research on Women.

Since taking up the reins at Mautner Project, Leslie has worked closely with the Board of Directors in what proved to be a difficult year for non-profits everywhere. Thanks to the generosity of all those listed in the back of this report, we were able to keep our excellent programs strong, to build up our back office operations (moving to less expensive space, hiring a development associate, purchasing a new efficient data base system) and were able to develop a new program in tobacco cessation, expand our education and training to the Baltimore area, build up our volunteer base, retain our unique programming aimed at African American lesbian and bisexual women, and keep the organization moving forward.

## MAUTNER PROJECT: IMPROVING THE HEALTH OF LESBIANS, BISEXUAL, AND TRANSGENDER WOMEN WHO PARTNER WITH WOMEN

Mautner Project (MP) was founded in 1990 by Susan Hester, and inspired by her partner Mary-Helen Mautner, a lesbian mother who died of breast cancer at age 44. Just weeks before her death, Mary-Helen spoke about the need for an organization that could help other lesbians face the challenges of cancer. She realized that as a white, middle-class, employed, “out” lesbian with health insurance, accepting doctors, a loving family and network of friends, she was much more fortunate than many of her lesbian sisters with serious health problems.

Inspired by this vision, Mautner Project is dedicated to developing a health care system that is guided by social justice, provides equal access, and is responsive to the needs of all people. We pursue this vision through education, advocacy, research and direct service. Mautner Project:

- Delivers services and support to lesbian, bisexual and transgender (LBT) women who partner with women (WPW) with cancer and other life-threatening diseases, their families and caregivers.
- Educates WPW about important health issues, including the need for preventive care, particularly regular breast and cervical cancer screenings, screenings relating to diabetes and heart disease, and the need for healthful habits, including smoking cessation, exercise and good nutrition.
- Educates health care providers about the needs and concerns of their WPW clients in order to increase their cultural competency, reduce stigmatizing behaviors, and create quality services and environments that are welcoming and therefore fully utilized.
- Promotes WPW health through national research, advocacy and activism.

The Mautner Project is a tax-exempt 501(c)(3) non-profit organization governed by an all-volunteer Board of Directors composed of community leaders, health care providers, cancer survivors and caregivers.

## DIRECT SERVICES

### Client Services and Support Groups

Mautner Project provides a wide range of direct services to lesbian, bisexual, and transgender women who partner with women, and their families. We offer provider referral service, educational materials, and telephone support to women nationwide.

In the DC Metro Area, our Client Services team in 2008 included two professionals and some 36 active volunteers. We provided direct services to an average of 8 – 10 active clients per month. These services included home visits, hospital visits, phone support, child care, lawn care, light housekeeping, patient navigation, help with paperwork and continuing transportation to treatment appointments for women battling cancer.

Mautner Project offered a weekly bereavement group in 2008. Seven women and two facilitators met to share experiences and learn to cope with significant loss.

MP also sent Holiday Gift Baskets sent to 24 families, including active and recent clients. The baskets were packed with donated items such as small toiletries, metal water bottles, and books. In addition, Mautner staff and volunteers provided regular, on-going phone support to four clients outside our geographic region, and offered resources and support via email and telephone on a short-term basis to about two dozen people.

MP answered hundreds of requests for information and resources from consumers, students, and professionals throughout the United States. Mautner staff responded to such calls by checking our national database for local resources, or researching the topic and providing information or book recommendations. The requests range from a referral to a LGBT-friendly gynecologist in Michigan or a caregiver respite program in Nebraska, to a summary of recent obesity research for a psychologist in Maryland.

Volunteers are one of our greatest resources; levels of participation ranged from 12 hours a week working with terminally ill clients and their families, to two hours per month mowing a lawn. The level of quality care our clients receive would not have been the same without their help.

### Online Support Groups

In order to facilitate broader outreach, plans were made in 2008 to develop on-line support groups, to be introduced in 2009. They include:

- **Lesbian, Bi & Trans Survivors** is a member-driven email support group for lesbian, bisexual, and transgender women surviving serious illnesses.
- **Lesbian, Bi & Trans Caregivers** is a member-driven email support group for lesbian, bisexual, and transgender women caring for loved ones with serious diseases or disabilities.
- **Lesbian, Bi & Trans Bereavement** is a member-driven email support group for lesbian, bisexual, and transgender women grieving the loss of a loved one.

## EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS AND OUTREACH

### Mautner Project

- Educates lesbians and other women who partner with women about important health issues;
- Educates health-care providers about the needs and concerns of their lesbian/WPW clients;
- Teaches and mentors the next generation of LGBT health advocates, policy makers, and providers; and
- Educates policymakers, the press, and the general public about lesbian/WPW health.

### S.H.E. CIRCLE



**Spirit Health Education (SHE) Circle®** is a program developed by the Mautner Project, utilizing findings from its **Black Women 2 Women Spirit Health Study** of 2002, to address the health disparities in cancer screening and improve health outcomes for African American lesbians and bisexual women. Begun in 2003, and run through

2008, SHE Circle was funded by a grant from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and was the first ever federally-funded program for black lesbian health.

SHE Circle is an early detection and cancer education intervention. The project's goal is to increase the adoption of appropriate regular breast, cervical and colorectal cancer screening and healthy lifestyle choices (such as proper nutrition and exercise and smoking cessation) among African American lesbian and bisexual women in a culturally competent framework. The program is a multi-level intervention that links aspects of African diasporic spirituality and community engagement with relevant information on creating and maintaining health and wellness, principally as they relate to reduction in cancer risk. SHE Circle consists of six educational sessions that provide information and support for healthy living by creating and recognizing communities of women who assume ownership and responsibility for their personal health as well as the health of their sisters.

During 2007 through the end of the grant in August, 2008, SHE Circle was tasked with replication. During this time, the project staff conducted three (3) facilitator training sessions: at SunServe Sunshine Social Services., Inc., in South Florida, the University of Pittsburgh, and Affinity Community Services in Chicago. Mautner Project also ran a SHE Circle group in Washington, DC.

## REMOVING THE BARRIERS TO ACCESS HEALTHCARE FOR ALL LBT PEOPLE

Removing the Barriers (RTB) is the first and only training program for physicians and health care staff members on the health care needs of lesbians. RTB is designed to assist medical providers to provide more culturally competent care by

identifying potential barriers to care faced by sexual minorities, particularly women-who-partner-with-women. Developed by Mautner Project in cooperation with the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention, RTB is an experiential training program encouraging participants to explore many aspects of culture including personal privilege, the cultural interplay of individuals

and the medical system, and the impact of institutional heterosexism. RTB provides specific focus on cultural distinctions of women who partner with women and how they impact their access to preventive health screenings as well as risk factors that may be significant for this specific population. RTB explores the use of culturally appropriate language, family recognition and legal issues, as well as clinical concerns specific to women who partner with women, in an effort to aid providers in reaching their goal of serving underserved women.

## TOBACCO CESSATION GROUPS

Studies of smoking behaviors have found that prevalence is consistently higher among gays, lesbians and bisexuals than among the general population, even though the LGBT population surveyed has higher educational attainment (usually associated with lower, not higher, smoking rates). MP has been a pioneer in the area of LGBT targeted smoking cessation outreach. We developed a messaging and advertising campaign, “Delicious Lesbian Kisses,” that pitched an alternative, anti-tobacco norm for the community.

For 2008, MP received a \$20,000 grant from the American Lung Association of DC to provide smoking cessation services. We have found that when LGBT people feel they are in a “safe space” – when they are able to openly discuss same sex partners and personal smoking triggers in a supportive environment – their efforts to quit are more successful.

With the help of this grant, we were able to publish two ads, conduct extensive on-on-one outreach in a variety of venues, and completed Freedom From Smoking Cessation Programs. As a result of the success of our work in 2008, MP was awarded two grants by the American Lung Association of DC totaling \$115,000 for work to be completed in 2009.

### OTHER OUTREACH

Because of both its expertise and its ability to reach out to and speak to women in the lesbian, bisexual and transgender communities, MP is regularly approached by colleague organizations to assist in reaching clients. For 2008, we contracted with Project Wish of the District of Columbia Department of Public Health to do community outreach to lesbians with limited income in order to provide them with no-fee screenings for breast and cervical cancers.

## PRIDE OUTREACH

Washington, DC has some of the largest Pride celebrations in the country. Because the community is aware of the need for having different pride celebrations for various subsets of the community in terms of race and sexual preference, and because the celebrations are so large, Pride spans the course of three months. Pride celebrations include separate large festivals for Youth, Leather/BDSM, Black Pride, Latino Pride, Trans Pride, and Capital Pride (which allows for all the entire community to celebrate in one place) as well as smaller events and bar nights for lesbian and bisexual-identified women as well as transgender people. Pride celebrations in DC have become so well-known across the country that many people trek long distances just to have the opportunity to celebrate being “out” in the nation’s capital. MP’s presence at Pride allows for visibility to people in the local and national LGBT community.

## ADVOCACY, ACTIVISM, AND OUTREACH

In 2008, Mautner Project engaged in advocacy and research in several ways: SHE Circle: Mautner Project concluded its 5-year SHE (Spirit Health Education) Circle grant, which included an evaluation component to determine lessons learned from the creation and running of the program. Researchers Judy Bradford, Ph.D. and Alicia Matthews, Ph.D. gave the program a positive evaluation and will be writing up the results for possible peer-reviewed publication.

Mautner Project participated as a member of the Board or Advisory Board of the following organizations: the National LGBT Policy Roundtable, the National Breast Cancer Coalition; and the National Advisory Council for the Healthcare Equality Index sponsored by the Human Rights Campaign and the Gay and Lesbian Health Association. Mautner Project is an active member of the National Coalition for LGBT Health. Executive Director Leslie Calman was invited to be affiliated with the Center for Population Research in LGBT Health of the Fenway Institute as a participating scientist.

Mautner Project contributed several health sections to "A New Beginning: Policy recommendations to improve the lives of LGBT people and eliminate discrimination from federal policies," a briefing book compiled by the National LGBT Policy Roundtable proposing federal actions to further the LGBT rights agenda and given to newly-elected President Obama.
